Training Attendance Policy

Virginia Main Street trainings are an important opportunity to gain new skills, network with other communities, and learn about resources available for downtown revitalization. Every attempt is made to make trainings an excellent learning experience that is convenient and reasonably priced. Because attendance at trainings is important, VMS has developed the following attendance policy.

Each designated community is expected to attend as follows:

- **Manager's Retreat:** The executive director or program manager is expected to attend.
- **The Milestones Award Luncheon** is recommended but not mandatory.
- **Spring Feature, Summer Tool Kit and Essentials:** Communities are required to attend at least two of these three training sessions. Additionally, at least two non-staff members (board member, committee member, local government official, or citizen volunteer) must attend at least one of these training sessions.
- **E-Trainings:** There is no attendance policy for these trainings at this time. However, as these trainings involve statewide collaboration and a unique opportunity to educate many non-staff members at once, every effort should be made to participate as often as possible.
- **Living Towns; North Carolina Main Street Conference; or Virginia Downtown Development Association:** These trainings are highly recommended but do not count toward the minimum requirements. Scholarships are often available for the VDDA Annual Conference.
- **National Main Streets Conference:** New Main Street managers should attend the National Main Street Conference within two years of being hired and experienced managers should return at least once every five years. Community officials are encouraged to attend. Scholarships are often available for this conference.
