Downtown Mall Owners Get Advice on How to Spruce Up

Most people who walk down Winchester's Loudous Street Mall look at the merchandise in the store windows, shop in the various specialty stores, and maybe buy a few things.

But they are not Kathleen Frazier. She walked down the pedestrian mall Friday and analyzed the building's facades, taking pictures and making notes.

Frazier, an architect, came to Winchester to give advice on how to make the mall look more attractive—and more marketable.

She and her husband, William, of Fratier Associates in Staunton, were hired by the Virginia Division of Historic Landmarks to give design ideas to the five localities chosen to be in the Virginia Main Street Program—Winchester, Bedford, Franklin, Petersburg, and Fredericksburg.

The Main Street Program provides free advice on promotion, organization, economic restructuring, and design of downtown shopping areas to those who are interseted.

The Fraziers' job is to help people in the design of their buildings, including color, awaings, and signs. They will refer building owners to other architects for major renovations.

Any downtown business interested in improving its storefront can receive the Fraziers' help, as the five owners did who volunteered Friday.

The Fraziers have begun studying 52 buildings in the five towns since they started in April. "I've got enough to keep me out of trouble." said Frazier, 30, who made this trip to Winchester without her husband.

She inspected five buildings, accompanied by Sonya Tolley, director of the Downtown Development Board, and Tolley's assistant, Anna Thomson







The Main Street Idea Pitch is a downtown revitalization idea competition that provides the winner a \$5,000 grant to implement their idea. The competition is geared towards stimulating the Virginia Main Street network of communities and professionals to craft imaginative Main Street project ideas. Projects should connect to the community's vision to create vibrant, peoplecentered places to live, work and invest and focus on highly visible changes and measuring progress and results that demonstrate the revitalization effort is underway and succeeding.

REBUILD VIRGINIA



The Rebuild VA Grant Fund is a program to help small businesses and nonprofits whose normal operations were disrupted by COVID-19.

Businesses and non-profits that are approved for a Rebuild VA grant may receive up to 3 times their average monthly eligible expenses up to a maximum of \$10,000.

The Rebuild VA program has been capitalized with \$70 million and will provide assistance to approximately 7,000 businesses and nonprofits. Half of the program funds will be distributed to eligible small businesses and nonprofits operating in low-income and economically disadvantaged communities, including ensuring there is adequate representation of minority-owned and women-owned businesses.


